

The East Gippsland Shire Council Meeting By Juliet Walker

On Tuesday, 27 June 2023, I attended a Council meeting at East Gippsland Shire Council, Council chambers.

When mum and I got to the Council offices, the Councillor Support Officer met us in reception and took us upstairs to the Council Chambers where I met the Mayor and some of the Councillors.

Councillor Allen and Councillor Stow came over and introduced themselves. Councillor Allen explained the history of the Rotary Junior Community Award and how it started in Bairnsdale, which was in a building right across the road from the Council offices.

Once the meeting started, Cr Reeves introduced me to the other Councillors and members of the gallery and explained that I was attending the meeting as part of my Rotary award. He wished me well with my leadership aspirations and the rest of my time at primary school.

The agenda for the night was very big. The approval of the 2023 / 2024 budget was listed for discussion along with numerous Capital Works reports, a petition against a proposed fence on Raymond Island and the 10 year financial plan. The report on the petition was listed first on the agenda and after the formalities, members of the gallery were invited to discuss their concerns with the proposed fence on Raymond Island. It was clear from the number of people at the Council meeting, that the proposed building of the fence on public land on Raymond Island, was causing them much concern. The Councillors voted to hold the planned building and seek further information prior to voting on the building of the fence.

After this, the Councillors started to debate the budget report. It was a very heated discussion with many Councilors against the proposed budget. One of the main concerns raised by the Councillors was the introduction of green waste fees and the significant rise in rates across the Shire, with so many residents already impacted by the current cost of living crisis.

I was very confused with all the discussion. Councillor Buckley requested to move a motion to stop any further passing of the budget. The meeting stopped at this point so the CEO could gain advice from the General Manager Corporate Services, who oversees the

governance of Council meetings. It was advised that a notice of motion could not be moved at this point. After much debate, the budget went to vote and was passed 7 votes in favor, to 2 votes against.

Mum and I left at this stage as the meeting was running very late and they still had many reports to get through. I really enjoyed my time at the Council meeting and found the topics interesting, along with learning the process of a Council meeting.

Neurodiversity emphasises the natural variation in how an individual's brain functions and how they perceive and interact with the world, leading to diverse ways of learning and communicating. While most young people are neurotypical, some exhibit variations in brain development, such as ADHD, autism or dyslexia, making them neurodivergent.



Embracing neurodiversity involves accepting, celebrating, and supporting neurodivergent children and adolescents without attempting to change or treat their differences. Using respectful language, challenging unhelpful attitudes, avoiding assumptions, and actively promoting inclusivity can help embrace neurodiversity effectively.

Acknowledging the unique ways neurodiverse young people do things and then adapting tasks and activities to ensure their full participation will encourage them to develop strategies that feel natural to them. It will help improve their mental health, wellbeing and sense of self. By recognising and nurturing their strengths, parents and caregivers can contribute to building an inclusive and compassionate society where all young people can thrive.

Learning more about neurodiversity, equips caregivers with insights into effective communication techniques, educational strategies, and parenting approaches tailored to the specific needs of their neurodivergent child. We hope you take time to reflect on the information offered in this month's edition, and we always welcome your feedback.




